Team GB Tokyo 2020 Signing Ceremony held at Keio University



The signing ceremony for the Team GB Preparation Camp for Tokyo 2020 was held in the Event Hall of the Kyosei-kan Collaboration Complex at Hiyoshi Campus on Tuesday, March 21. President Seike attended the ceremony along with the Chairman of the British Olympic Association (BOA), Sir Hugh Robertson, the Mayor of Yokohama City, Ms. Fumiko Hayashi, the Mayor of Kawasaki City, Mr. Norihiko Fukuda, and the President of the Japanese Olympic Committee, Mr. Tsunekazu Takeda.

Keio University and the cities of Yokohama and Kawasaki concluded a Memorandum of Understating with BOA in February 2016 for hosting the British Olympic Team's preparation camp for Tokyo 2020. The contract signed at this ceremony determines the use of facilities, as well as the partnership between the four parties, including the facilities to be used, duration, the sports to be hosted, and exchange projects.

Keio University is due to host a total of thirteen events—archery, fencing, modern pentathlon, badminton, gymnastics, table tennis, basketball, judo, taekwondo, boxing, weightlifting, karate, and hockey—from July 3 to August 11, 2020 (including the camp set-up period), centering on the Commemorative Hall, the Athletics Field, and the Mamushidani Gymnasium on Hiyoshi Campus. In addition to the provision of facilities, the university will work to deepen exchange in areas other than sports such as research, education, history, culture, and art. It will also help make contributions to both the regional and international communities going forward.

Mr. Ryo Tateishi, a graduate of Keio University and a bronze medalist in the 200-meter breaststroke at the London Olympics, served as the master of ceremonies. The four representatives of the partnership each gave a short address following Mr. Tateishi's explanation of the contract. A guest speech was then made by the British Ambassador to Japan, His Excellency Paul Madden CMG, after which the representatives signed the contract bringing the ceremony to a close. A post-ceremony reception was held in a friendly atmosphere in the adjacent venue.




At the end of the meeting, the children gave high fives with the athletes and said good bye, hoping to see them again in 2020!

## Keio Signs MOU as Official Partner of ParalympicsGB



Keio University concluded a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the British Paralympic Association (BPA) represented by CEO Tim Hollingsworth regarding the preparation camp of ParalympicsGB for the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games together with Kawasaki City and the City of Yokohama. The MOU Signing Ceremony was held at Keio University's Hiyoshi Campus on Thursday, May 24, 2018.

The four partners aim to facilitate exchange not only in relation to the preparation camp, but in the disciplines of sports science, medicine, and education, in various cultural fields, and with the regional communities. Among the attendees were the British Judo Team headed by Ian Johns, which held a Randori session with members of the Keio Judo Club earlier that morning.

Keio University President Akira Haseyama acknowledged the team as he gave his speech, stating that "Para-athletes allow us to realize just how diverse the world is and are the prime example of how much one can achieve." He also expressed his belief "that working as a team together with the world-class para-athletes and the support staff of ParalympicsGB here at

Hiyoshi Campus will have a hugely positive influence, and I am certain that this will be a once-in-a-lifetime experience, not only for our students, but for the whole Keio community." Furthermore, he reinforced the university's commitment and support by adding that "Keio will do all it can to impart the strength and vitality of this event and ensure the athletes of ParalympicGB will be able to compete at their highest level."

It should also be noted that Keio and the two cities officially agreed to host the preparation camp of Team GB in March 2017.



[Yokohama City Event Report] December 03 (Monday): "Seminar for Learning About the United Kingdom and Yokohama" Learning from The United Kingdom's Inclusive Society Culture] Implemented as Part of the Project for Recruiting a Host Town for Great Britain's Preparation Camp!



The City of Yokohama has been moving ahead with initiatives in various fields related to the host town for Great Britain's preparation camp in order to foster opportunities for welcoming the GB national team to Japan ahead of 2020.

Welcoming guests from Great Britain's Olympic Committee, Yoshie Kurisu held a seminar focusing on the inclusive society of Great Britain and held a program providing experiences of British culture.

The seminar was attended by approximately fifty people who had applied in advance, and the British House, where the seminar was held, was filled almost to capacity. Thanks to everyone who participated!

Here is a brief introduction to the seminar.

The seminar started with a speech by Bill Sweeny, the CEO of the British Olympic Committee.

During his speech, Bill said, "The Tokyo 2020 Olympics and Paralympics provide us with a valuable opportunity to spread the word about Japan's culture, etc., throughout the world. Yokohama will also be the first place that the young team GB athletes experience when they arrive in Japan. I pray that the Tokyo 2020 Olympics will be a wonderful event."

In 2016, Ms. Kurisu took part in the flag handover ceremony at the Rio Paralympics as a stage advisor.

She then decided that she wanted to foster coaches capable of providing guidance for disabled people in order to adopt aerial training (techniques for aerial stage performances) in Japan, and consequently invited coaches from the United Kingdom to train coaches over here. She has collaborated with UK artist teams up until now, and intends to take an active role in ensuring that this continues.

She states that her aim is to ensure that both disabled people and people without disabilities can come together to take part in programs from 2021 that enable disabled people to engage in activities as they like and at the level they prefer within their own community.

- \*1: An NPO established under the concept of slowing down the pace of the currently fast-moving society a little so that everybody can enjoy their lives. It aims at creating a society that is in accord with diversity through the power of art.
- \*2: People who remove all barriers from the stage and create environments that promote creativity so that disabled artists can perform.
- \*3: Escorts who accompany disabled artists onto the stage and collaboratively expand their potential.



After this speech, a group of musicians who love Celtic music from Keio University, where it has been decided that Team GB will hold its preparation camp, gave a performance. They had practiced a number of English songs especially for this day.



Members of the Design Team Liviu spared some of their time to assist in the teatime portion of the evening, and served slightly large volumes of traditional English fare (mince pies, sausage rolls, shortbread). The food was slightly different to what is normally served during afternoon tea, which is a little more refined. Hopefully, they will serve an authentic afternoon tea next time.



The World Christmas 2018 event was held in annex 8 of the Yamate Seiyoukan in December. Ms. Kasai and Ms. Ishihata of Design Team Liviu decorated the British House with a wonderful array of British-style Christmas decorations. Some of these decorations were also on display at the venue.




The event was carried out on a high note thanks to the speeches, performances, teatime and the British atmosphere.



During question time, the children fired off a wide range of questions, such as "How many hours do you train every day?", "What made you take up swimming?" and "How do you concentrate on your training?".

James Guy, silver medalist at the 2016 Rio Olympics, explained to the children just how important working hard every day no matter what happens by saying, "I couldn't swim until I was three years old. However, I discovered how much fun swimming can be while at school, and trained really hard to a stage where I was able to take part in local tournaments, and the result of this is what you see before you today."

We hope that the Japanese cultural program provided them all with a relaxing break amid their extremely hard daily training schedule, which is carried out in an unfamiliar environment.



First of all, we obtained the understanding and cooperation of local residents to install flags and decorate the many steps leading from Kita-yamata Station on the Yokohama Municipal Subway Green Line to the Yokohama International Pool.





We raised the Union Jack and the Yokohama International Pool flag on flagpoles at the entrance to the pool, which is the first thing that drivers see when they enter the facility.



To make sure that the team members recognized our feeling of welcome, we hung large GO GB 2020 banners, streamers stating "Victory" and the Union Jack in the main pool where the GB national swimming team were training.



Mr. Anson was appointed as the new CEO of the BOA in May 2019 and has taken up the post on November 1st of the same year.



On Sunday, 20th October, 2019, "Hotchpotch Music Festival 2019" was held around Nihonodori and Yokohama Park.

"Hotchpotch" in English means "mixed up" ("Gochamaze") in Japanese. The event, which started in 2009 and celebrated its 11th year this year, is a Gochamaze Music Festival that anyone can join regardless of country, generation, gender, or disability. The festival is held every year on Nihon- odori, the main street that symbolizes Yokohama and that has welcomed various cultures for 160 years since the opening of the port, conveying diverse cultures, individuality and values through music.

We invited Mr. Gerald Muirhead, a bagpiper from the UK, which is the country that Yokohama is designated to host, to this year's festival. Dressed in traditional Scottish tartan-checked clothing, he played the unique-sounding bagpipes, attracting many people who had come to the festival. In the finale, he performed together with musicians from Yokohama, strengthening cultural exchanges through playing music.

We collaborated with Scotland to promote the Olympics and Paralympics to its local citizens.



Based on the relationship of mutual exchange that started in the mid 19th century, the city of Yokohama and the Scottish Government have been working together, especially in 2019 and 2020, in the areas of: (1) exchange programs in the fields of culture and tourism, (2) promotion of networks between companies and institutions related to the marine industry, (3) civic exchanges triggered by the Rugby World Cup 2019™ and the Tokyo 2020 Olympics and Paralympics, (4) promotion of inter-university collaboration including student and academic exchanges.

In October 2019, Fiona Hyslop, the Cabinet Secretary for Economy, Fair Work and Culture of the Scottish Government, visited Japan for the Rugby World Cup 2019™ and met Fumiko Hayashi, the Mayor of Yokohama. They reconfirmed their commitment to deepen the relationship toward the Olympic and Paralympic Games.

We are conducting promotional activities in local areas in Scotland in order to deepen our relationship with Scotland and become a better partner, and to give everyone in Scotland a chance to get to know Yokohama in preparation for the Olympics.

In 2018, we distributed information on tourism in Yokohama through Scottish magazines and online media. We continued two projects in 2019. First, we asked the world travel bloggers known as "Two Scots Abroad", a couple from Scotland who have a major influence, to cover and convey the attractive aspects of Yokohama which they discovered during their trip by posting them on their blog. Second, we promoted the attractive business environment, including the support for startups in Yokohama, to local areas through online magazines and business media in Scotland.


The children from Coventry were slightly tired after the long trip from Tokyo in the early morning, but looked very happy to receive such a warm welcome.

In addition, through the idea that "creativity can be a positive catalyst," she explained that her business focuses on conveying information, networking to connect people, and collaborating with other fields.

In the following Lightning Talks in the first half, a presentation was delivered on similar creative activities being conducted in Yokohama and Japan. In order to make social issues known to many people, activities on applying creativity in various fields were introduced, such as a project in which an artist creates a work such as an illustration that depicts greenhouse gas reductions and then shares it, and an architect-led residence support site for single-parent families.





In the latter half, the discussion focused on questions from participants. Ms. Lori appreciated the potential and vision in Yokohama, saying, "People in Yokohama understand creativity and show their involvement through effective networking," and added, "To define a vision for urban policy, we need to seek what the city's needs are and what to do about it."

Joint Statement from UK Sport, the British Olympic Association and the British Paralympic Association on the postponement of the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games.



On Tuesday, March 24, The International Olympic Committee and The Tokyo 2020 Organizing Committee announced the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games will be postponed by the summer of 2021 in the wake of the Global Pandemic of COVID-19.

On the same day, the British Olympic Committee, the British Paralympic Committee and UK Sport issued a joint statement.

#### JOINT BOA, BPA AND UK SPORT STATEMENT

The British Olympic Association (BOA), British Paralympic Association (BPA) and UK Sport welcome the news of the postponement of the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Chief Executive of the BOA, Andy Anson, said: "It is with profound sadness that we accept the postponement, but in all consciousness it is the only decision we can support, in light of the devastating impact COVID-19 is having on our nation, our communities and our families.

"Alongside UK Sport and the BPA, we have consulted with the National Governing Bodies of summer Olympic and Paralympic sports and with athlete representative groups, including our Athletes' Commissions and the British Athletes' Commission. It is with their input and support that we have a unanimous view that the impact of COVID-19 on athletes' training and preparation means their regimes are now compromised irreparably. It is time for them to stop thinking about Tokyo 2020 for now and be home and safe with their families.

"It would have been unthinkable for us to continue to prepare for an Olympic Games at a time the nation and the world no less is enduring great hardship. A postponement is the right decision.

"We have incredible sympathy for the Tokyo 2020 organising committee and indeed our colleagues at the IOC, who are working tirelessly to seek a positive outcome to this difficult scenario. The Olympic Games is a symbol of hope for us all and we are sure that we will be in Tokyo at the right and appropriate time as the world re-emerges from this dark period."

Sally Munday, CEO of UK Sport said, "We welcome today's decision from the IOC, IPC and Japan that the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games will be postponed. Given the unprecedented global challenge we face, today's news means that athletes, their coaches and support staff can now fully focus on what really matters at this terribly difficult time, keeping themselves and their families safe.

"We are working closely with government to ensure we can effectively support sports and their athletes through this distressing period. I'd like to take the opportunity to reassure sports that our guidance from last week remains in place that we will not seek to recover any financial performance investment or Athlete Performance Awards due to disruption caused by COVID-19. We also realise that today's decision has significant financial implications for our high performance system and we are working hard to identify the wide ranging impacts and scenarios and are in close contact with government to establish how best to support our summer Olympic and Paralympic sports and athletes to be ready for the Games when they do take place.

"I'd like to thank all our athletes who are playing a role in so many different ways in these challenging times, from supporting their local communities to inspiring us to stay active in our own homes. I'd also like to reassure the public that whilst the games are postponed, we strongly believe the power of sport will inspire the nation again."

Mike Sharrock, CEO of the BPA, added: "The British Paralympic Association fully supports the decision to postpone the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Stemming this global public health crisis and doing everything possible to safeguard the health and wellbeing of people should clearly take priority in these unprecedented times.

"We welcome the clarity this now gives Paralympic athletes throughout the world who have had their training and qualification plans severely disrupted but also recognise it will still be a deeply unsettling time for athletes who have worked for years focussed on delivering their best possible performance in Tokyo this summer.

"The British Paralympic Association is already implementing contingency plans to ensure ParalympicsGB athletes have everything in place to be best prepared for the Games when they are staged in 2021.

"We recognise that there are a huge range of factors to be considered when looking to postpone an event at this scale and we acknowledge the scale of the challenge for our friends at the Tokyo organising committee, the IOC and IPC in addressing these.

"Now is the time for us all to work together to overcome this global threat. Sport has a unique power to inspire and bring people together and we are certain that the Tokyo Olympic and Paralympic Games can be that beacon of hope for the whole world to focus on to show what the human spirit can achieve."

We wish to state that this decision – to postpone the Games – should in no way be a reflection on the excellent organisation of the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games by the IOC, the Tokyo Organising Committee and the Government of Japan.

Our thoughts remain with the families and individuals affected by COVID-19, as well as the front-line workers – including many health care professionals from the UK sports' network – who are working to keep our communities safe and well.

We also sympathise with the many hundreds of athletes, both in the UK and globally, whose careers and personal ambitions are being impacted after many years of hard work and training.

We remain committed to taking our Olympic and Paralympic athletes to Tokyo for the next edition of the summer Games, at the appropriate time, in the hope that it will be a celebration of the world re-emerging from this unprecedented time.

In the Team GB videos, top athletes introduce workouts that range from simple to do exercises that can be followed by those who do not engage in regular exercise, all the way to training for advanced exercisers.

Also try diving competition athlete Leon Taylor's video on yoga. Your body will feel much lighter.

For those who are confident in their physical condition, try taking on one of the highintensity interval training (HIIT) routines, in which you'll alternate between periods of all-out exercises and short periods of rest. It's a real challenge!

Also, there are training videos that target the core, the upper body, and the lower body. Feel free to search for the right video that meets your needs.

If you're feeling sluggish and want to get your body moving, get in a good workout and say goodbye to stress with the Team GB videos! If you keep it up, perhaps you'll find yourself with a body like an athlete!

The Netflix original documentary film "Rising Phoenix" was released one year before the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games, which has been now postponed to next year, features the Paralympics' history with stories of Paralympians in their prime from across the world and their enthusiasm for the Games.

This film features one of the Paralympic superstars of the United Kingdom in his prime, Jonnie Peacock (an athletics athlete in 100m T44). When he was 19 years old, he won a gold medal in front of a massive audience at the London 2012 Games, and another at the Rio 2016 Games four years later. Peacock, who runs 100 m in the 10 second level, is expected to win his third consecutive gold medal at the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games.

### Looking back on the history of the UK's Stoke Mandeville Games with video

The Paralympics originated from injured war veterans engaging in sport using wheelchairs, referred to as the Wheelchair Games held in Stoke Mandeville Hospital in London in 1948.

Dr. Ludwig Guttman, who encouraged the sport with goal of rehabilitation for veterans injured with spinal cord paralysis in World War II, is called the 'father of Paralympics'. In the 'Rising Phoenix', his daughter appears and recounts her father's memories.

# Online Lecture by Head of Marketing at Team GB held at Yokohama Shogyo High School



Yokohama City is promoting activities in various fields related to the Team GB pre-camp and host town program in order to create an atmosphere to welcome Team GB during Tokyo 2020.

On Wednesday, November 18, 2020, Mr. Edward Jones, Head of Marketing of Team GB, gave an online lecture titled "An introduction to the Brand and Team GB's campaigns" for the students on the Sports Management Course and International Course at Yokohama Shogyo High School.

Mr. Jones first explained how BOA has been working on brand development and their approach. BOA has been taking various approaches to unite and inspire the nation through the power of Team GB and the values of the Olympic movement.

He also shared how Team GB makes British people interested in the team and the history of the team, which has become the most popular sports team in the UK under its vision for sustainable success and brand for good. One of their approaches is promotion through social media channels.

The team has 3 million followers across six different social media channels and tries to find ways to drive deeper engagement outside of the Games in order to increase engagement during the Games.

BOA approaches fans through social media channels by posting fewer, bigger and better stories, then aligning consistent themes that build up toward their purpose to inspire richer levels of engagement. BOA does this across all channels, but takes a bespoke approach to each and focuses on where they can have the most impact and on high growth areas. To make this approach successful, they create digital environments through content, platforms, products and events.

In the latter half, he introduced the education program that BOA has been working on as the legacy of London 2012 and the campaign run for Tokyo 2020 to sustain their brand development.

To ensure Team GB is supported by the nation and well regarded by partners, peers and prospects and to make the team more valuable in future, BOA aims to enhance their performance, and attract and increase investment.

#### Q & A

- Q. I would like to start my own business in the next few months. How should I promote it effectively on a small budget?
- A. It is good to focus simply on the digital channel. Then you should think about your target audience, because they will be powerful promoters for your branding. Please remember why you started the business and do not hesitate to ask for help from anyone who can provide it.
- Q. I would like to know the difference between Japan and the UK in how to inspire the nation for the Olympics and about Team GB's approach.
- A. In my opinion, we seek better opportunities to boost momentum. We tend to capture key moments that will have an impact, rather than promote something on a daily basis.

- Q. I think the most effective marketing for sports is to gain more spectators watching the games, but we are now in a difficult situation due to the COVID-19 pandemic and spectators cannot come to games. Have you tried any new approaches amid the restrictions?
- A. We do not take as much time as in the past. The number of spectators could be the number of digital fans which is a very interesting opportunity, so both the team and I work on how to win more spectators. However, we always take this approach whether there is a pandemic or not.

There is a time difference during the Games, and it will be very late at night in the UK, so we must think how to access digital fans and how to feel the success of Team GB which is actually in Tokyo. I focus on these issues and try to practice this approach via social media and various other digital channels.



Q & A

Feedback from the students

What was the most impressive story?

- -Telecommunications and related networks are expanding around the world and it is important to take advantage of anything we can use to inspire the world through sports. (1st grader)
- -It was impressive that he focuses on every moment of athletes' journey instead of hot topics.
- I agree that spreading the moment ends up involving more and more people in the Olympics.

(2nd grader)

-In marketing, it is important to approach from different perspectives consistently and narrow down a target that will be supported by the nation.

(2nd grader)

-It was impressive that the team tries to find a way to keep deep engagement and attract the nation constantly outside of the Games, even though the Olympics is held every four years. Competing is the main part of the Olympic Games, and I never realized that it is important to attract the nation constantly, not only during the Games but also before and after the Games. But I learned that it is important to do so to increase engagement during the Games.

What was new to you or surprised you?

- -Using digital tools is always important.(3rd grader)
- -BOA verifies various data to inspire the team and boost momentum. (3rd grader)
- -The BOA promotion approach is broad compared to Japan, and they use athletes in their advertising campaigns.

- -It was interesting and new to me that BOA uses digital tools to attract and increase investment and advertise campaigns to inspire the nation.



#### ロックダウン中の練習も楽しく前向きに

春から夏にかけて英国では、コロナ感染拡大防止策として、ロックダウンという日本よりも厳しい措置が取られました。選手たちも公式練習はできず、自宅でトレーニングをする日々が続きました。

走り幅跳びに必要な砂場がないため、ロックダウン中はトレーニング用のラダーを購入し、毎週新しいステップを覚えて、楽しみながら身体を鍛えてきました。動画の中でも素早く複雑なステップを披露しています。

東京 2020 大会の延期を知った時は、「すごく残念だった」けれど、彼女は「人生なんて何の保証もないことは分かっていた」と、あくまで明るく語ります。「私の場合、完璧なプランが台無しになった経験は、これが初めてではありません」。

#### 15歳の時に知った「人生に絶対なんてことは何もない」という真実

彼女は、15歳まではラグビー選手として活躍していました。当時はプロになることが目標だったのですが、ボートの事故で片脚を失いました。


「その時学んだことは、人生は何が起きるか分からない。常に変化するものであり、絶対ということは何もないということです。人生のプランを手放すことは辛いけど、順応すること。それが人生だから」と、話します。

We watched a video message from Ms. Aimee Willmott, a British Olympic swimmer, at the beginning. This video message was prepared for everyone in Yokohama who hosted the British National Team at Tokyo 2020.

Ms. Aimee was one of the swimmers who visited Yokohama in 2019 to participate in the preparation camp held at Yokohama International Swimming Pool for FINA World Championship 2019. In the video, she said, "We hope you and your families are staying safe during these difficult times, and thank you so much for your support. We look forward to our pre-Olympic Games training camp in Yokohama."





英国代表チームの皆様が安心して事前キャンプを実施し、市民の皆様も安心して英国代表チームの皆様をお迎えしてもらうため、三密の回避、社会的距離の確保、マスクの着用、手洗い・消毒などの基本的対策を徹底するとともに、「プレイブック」(IOC、IPC、大会組織委員会)や国からの指示等に基づき、主に次の対策に取り組みます。

なお、昨年末以降の変異株の発生・流行など、日々刻々と変化する状況や求められる対策等に適切に対応してまいります。

(下記の対策は令和3年6月30日時点の内容です。)

#### (1) 英国代表チームの出入国時における感染症対策

- ・出発2週間前から隔離措置を始め、隔離生活期間中に合わせて5回検査を実施する。
- ・出国前3日間、毎日検査を実施し、陰性証明を取得し、検疫又は入国審査時に提出する。
- ・入国前14日間の健康モニタリングを提出する。
- ・入国時、空港にて検査を受検する(検査結果判明まで指示した待機場所に留まる)。

ホストタウンの事前キャンプに従事する市職員、宿泊施設や練習会場の関係者は、ワクチン接種を受け (任意)、従事前に 14 日間の健康観察を実施する (毎日の検温を含む)。接触の度合いに応じて、定期的にスクリーニング検査を受ける。

"The health and safety of the Japanese public and of the athletes and our delegation remains our number one priority and we know that our Preparation Camp partners have gone above and beyond to guarantee the safety of everyone when we arrive in country later this month."

We will fully comply with all COVID-19 Countermeasures pertaining to the official Games 'Playbooks' produced by Tokyo 2020/Japanese government and 'Host Town Acceptance Manual' to deliver safe and secure preparation camps in cooperation with the UK.

To safeguard all members of the Team GB and Paralympics GB and the local residents in Japan, we will fully comply with COVID-19 Countermeasures upon the official Games 'Playbooks' (IOC, IPC, Tokyo 2020) and 'Host Town Acceptance Manual' (Cabinet Secretariat) as follows;

- ① Measures upon entry into and departure from Japan imposed on the delegation
  - •All delegates need to self-isolate 14 days prior to the departure and have five COVID tests in total. They must obtain negative test certificate and submit it to the Quarantine Officer and/or at immigration control when they arrive in Japan.
  - •All delegates need to do 14 days of health monitoring prior to departure and submit the record.
  - •All delegates need to complete COVID-19 testing on arrival of the airport. (They will wait at the designated waiting area to get their test results).
- ② Measures during the Preparation Camps
- a. Screening Test All delegates who stay at camp sites will complete screening tests every day during their preparation camps.
- b. Behavioral Management of the delegation All delegates are restricted to travel only between their accommodation venues and their business destinations such as training venues.

c. Measures to avoid contact with the local residents – All delegates will use dedicated Games vehicles and do not use public transport. Any floors with Teams' rooms booked will be blocked and separate flows to avoid contact with other hotel guests. The delegation also use their private dining room

#### ③ Measures for Host Town staff

All staff members, who engage the preparation camps, in local governments, accommodation venues and training venues at Host Towns will be vaccinated (optional) and do 14 days of health monitoring including taking daily body temperatures. Also, they will have regular screening tests, depending on how close they get.

There has been a lot of planning across our teams in the UK and in Japan to prioritise the safety of our delegation and the health and safety of the Japanese public."

"We will go beyond the measures outlined in the playbooks in a number of areas including testing to deliver a safe environment for the team. We are very grateful to our Japanese partners for working so closely with us to achieve this and our athletes are very aware of how hard everyone is working on their behalf and are looking forward to arriving in Japan."



#### Here are some feedback from junior reporters

I enjoyed some performances at the stage in Nissan Stadium. The first performance was the special live show by "Alchemist" with school kids from Okamura Elementary School. It was so impressive. The vocalist of Alchemist is physically impaired, however, he did not hide his disability and performed with his head held high and it touched my heart. The next one was the show which allows the audience to join the stage to sing and dance "Paprika" together. After the show, I challenged wheelchair basketball. It was so hard to hit the shot with my hands due to using a wheelchair. But, it gradually became easier to hit the shot once I got the hang and made it more fun. It looks so easy when I watch TV showing top athletes hitting a shot, but I realized how hard it is when I actually tried it.

I got a chance to ride on two-seated bike for visually impaired athletes to sit on the back. I sat on the back, and an event staff pedaled a bike. I was told to close my eyes halfway through to experience how it feels like and it was so scary especially when we made a turn with my eyes closed. It's so amazing that para athletes are in sync with their guides at races even they are blind.

Mirei Katai

I didn't have much chance to watch para sports before. But I had many para-related experiences like wearing prosthesis and playing a wheelchair race and a wheelchair basketball at this event. It was hard to walk with prosthesis because it felt like my leg was bouncing. At the try-out area for a wheelchair race, I tried how fast I can pedal the wheel with sitting on the sports-specific wheelchair and the staff took my time. It was very tiring to pedal the wheel to be fast. I recorded 13.7km/h at the beginning but I got tired and gradually slowed down so it was only 7km/h at the end.

Shota Suzuki

The most interesting experience of the day was to time the speed when I shoot the ball. I have tried 3 times and my best record was 48km/h. The best record of all of the day was 87km/h. I wish I could kick the ball faster to beat the record. They also have a lot more activities like a wheelchair basketball and marathon with blinders on. Rintaro Fujie

So many booths were lined up. The most attractive experience for me was to wear prosthesis. It was very heavy and brought a little discomfort. It is incredible that the handicapped athletes with their legs walk and run with that much weight. I also tried the wheelchair basketball. It was hard to hit the goal with sitting on a wheelchair and could not make a goal, so I was so happy when I made a goal. I will give my best to support not only the Olympic athletes but also the Paralympic athletes.

# [Team GB Preparation Camp on the 13th of July: Open Training Session]

We, Junior reporters observed their training by the pool. Many junior high school students in the neighborhood including athletes from local school swimming clubs were also there for the open session and enthusiastic to learn from professionals like them.

The manager at YIP explained to us that they adjusted the pool condition as to the international level competitions wherein water temperature was as low as 27°C, and pool depth was deeper than usual. In this preparation camp, the athletes had 2-hour trainings in the morning and afternoon, for nine consecutive days.



We had the time to observe the training from the audience seats. Trainings included swimming 1500M back-to-back, freestyle with one arm up, and flutter kick practices where four athletes got in sync.

They were mainly swimming at a slow pace, but once the coach timed a race, it seemed like the athletes doubled their paces than usual. When they had the time, they waved their hands at us making us very happy.

After the training, some athletes and staff took the time to answer some of our questions. Junior reporters asked questions in English they worked hard to prepare. The interpreter translated the athletes' answer for us, and the athletes gave compliments on our English, and said "You speak good English."





Q: What do you think about the pool at Yokohama International Pool?

A: Thanks to all the excellent staff of the facility, the pool condition was very nice and perfect for swimming.

Q: How much do you swim a day?

A: On daily trainings, I swim for about 12-14km a day.

Q: What made you start swimming?

A: When I was 12, a certain swimming athlete inspired me.

Q: What is the interesting thing part of swimming?

A: I have a lot of chances to travel around the world for competitions. It is nice and fun to see the world.

Q: How do you move on when you fall into a slump?

A: I review my swimming to find out what is bad and restart from the beginning.

Q: What do you eat before a competition?

A: It is different for each athlete. I try to have lots of vegetables and protein.

In the guest room, you can see the British government collection of paintings and a huge fireplace which made the building just like a castle. The beautiful furniture and mysterious decorations also impressed us.

The 1st floor is mainly used for the guests, and the gatherings take place every day. British Embassy supports our diplomacy between Japan and Great Britain and assisting British citizens who currently live in Japan. The ambassador's residence was established in this place in 1875 and was rebuilt in 1931. Also, the ambassador actually lives there.



We were welcomed with afternoon tea in the beautiful room, and began our interview with English black tea and biscuits.

- A: Japanese martial arts, comics and dishes are very popular in the UK. Japan has advanced technology and a traditional culture. It is also attractive that the traffic is accurate which makes out travel very convenient.

#### Rintaro Fujie (5th grader)

- Q: "It is planned that the British Pre-Games Preparation Camp for 2020 Olympic takes place in Yokohama International Swimming Pool. Is there anything we can help at the time?"
- A: It's very nice to hear that! All the British athletes would appreciate your friendship. Please support the UK as well as Japan.

#### Mao Shimizu (5th grader)

- Q: "What is the most famous sightseeing spot in the UK?"
- A: Lake District is very famous for tourists. It is known as the birthplace of Peter Rabbit story. Of course, we have many more famous tourist spots. I would recommend you to visit and see.

#### Naoki Kikuchi (5th grader)

- Q: "Would you continue an international exchange with Tsuzuki-ward after 2020 Olympic Games?"

Yokohama City is the official host town for the UK for Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games. # We visited the Nippon Foundation Para Arena in Tokyo and met with Prince Harry!

This time, we visited the Nippon Foundation Para Arena in Tokyo, which is known as the base of Japan para-sports.

Britain's Prince Harry, who was visiting Japan to watch the final match in the Rugby World Cup (held in International Stadium Yokohama on November 2nd) happen to be there to interact with Japanese para athletes. Junior reporters that did not know Price Harry's visit were so surprised by the unexpected show-up, but they did a great job to cover Para Arena. Now please check it out!

Does anyone have a plan to watch Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games to be held next year? We, junior reporters, visited the Nippon Foundation Para Arena in Odaiba this time.

The Nippon Foundation Para Arena was built to provide the place for para-athletes to strengthen their abilities, and also to allow many people to learn about para-sports in preparation for the Tokyo 2020 Paralympics. The arena is used not only for the training of Japanese national para-athletes but also for those of club teams. It is one of the few valuable facilities which also allow athletes from oversea to learn about Japanese language and culture.

When you first step into the building, you will find a giant artwork on the wall. This piece was designed by Shingo Katori and made from Legos. You can see Tokyo Skytree and Tokyo Tower in the work that expresses a wish to bring the world as one which including all the town.



The arena incorporates universal design principles and made it easy for to understand. It is fully wheelchair accessible that the walkway is wide enough for wheelchair users to pass each other, and also braille blocks and slopes are equipped. Most doors are also wide and sliding-typed for sports-specific wheelchairs. In fact, we did saw wheelchair users passed through a doorway so smoothly.

We walked in the gymnasium called 'Arena' and saw some athletes were having the training of Boccia and Wheelchair Rugby.

Boccia involves throwing, rolling or hitting six red and six blue balls toward a white target ball called jack and compete as close as possible. All the athletes were taking careful aim and rolling balls. We could see how earnest they were.

It was also the first time to watch Wheelchair Rugby. It seems that there are some other detailed rules, such as teams have just 40 seconds to score a try. When I look carefully, the wheelchairs which the athletes use are different from ones we usually see, the angle of the wheels is inverted V-shaped. And the structure of wheelchairs is different between attack and defense. When athletes clashed, the echo in the Arena was so loud. I thought this is a bit of dangerous sport. I wondered if athletes were not afraid or hurt to clash and fall.

And as we were watching their training, Britain's Prince Harry has walked in the Para Arena! And he talked to us!

Prince Harry is the patron of the Rugby Football Union. He is very passionate about sports promotion and visited Japan this time to support the match in the Rugby World Cup final.







### **Reporters' impressions**

My image of Prince Harry is uptight in a suit and goes everywhere with a bodyguard, but the prince surprisingly showed up in casual clothes with no bodyguard. He sat diagonally forward of me and talked to everybody with a smile. He also asked me "Can you speak English?" and I answered "I can speak just a little.", but he gently replied, "That's enough." It was so impressive to see the prince nearby whom I usually watch on TV.

After a while, the prince walked towards athletes of Wheelchair Rugby and Boccia. I thought he was nice that he talks to every athlete.

I met Prince Harry face-to-face, and now I feel the closeness. At the Olympic and Paralympic Games, I wanted to support both Japanese and British teams. The attraction of sports is boundless! I'm looking forward to the next year.

#### **Cup Noodles Museum – Jotaro Yamamoto**

I eat instant noodles, which are quick and easy. Today, I want to tell you about the Cup Noodles Museum where you can have fun learning about instant noodles.

Cup Noodle was originally a brand of instant noodles and rice sold by Nissin Food Products Co., Ltd., which is a Japanese food-processing company. The Cup Noodles Museum commemorates the invention of the world's first instant noodles by the company's then president, Momofuku Ando.



When you first step into the museum, you will find a giant artwork of a Cup Noodle, and lots of visitors take photos here first. Then, when you go up to the second floor, you will find many exhibits on cup noodles up to the present day, clearly showing how instant noodles were invented after President Ando came up with and developed the idea.

As you go on to the upper floor, there is a hands-on experience area where you can actually make your own Cup Noodle. This is very popular, and you can start from the basics including kneading and stretching the dough, and choose flavors and ingredients to make your own Cup Noodle.

#### All about Nippon Maru Memorial Park - Moko Matsuyama



Nippon Maru Memorial Park is a park in front of the Yokohama Landmark Tower where there is also a huge ship called Nippon Maru. It's a hilly park, so it's good exercise to run around the area. In addition, by going up the hill you can enjoy wonderful views of beautiful trees like oaks, and also a Ferris wheel. It is a unique and breathtaking sight which can be seen only in Minatomirai. The best thing about the pier is that the passenger terminal has a roof garden which is open to the public 24/7. It features an eco-friendly wood deck and also a lawn area. It is popularly known as "Whale Back" because of its image of a giant whale in the ocean, and it gets busy with people when huge cruise ships arrive and leave. Because Osanbashi juts out into the bay, it provides outstanding views of all the tourist spots which symbolize the Minatomirai area such as Cosmo Clock 21, the giant Ferris wheel, Yokohama Red Brick Warehouse, Yokohama Landmark Tower, Intercontinental Yokohama Grand Hotel which is designed like a sail, and Yokohama Bay Bridge on the other side.





For example, it's good for Aglio e Olio, stir-fried with dried young sardines and dried shrimp or stir-fried with pork and woodear (Kikurage) mushrooms. Komatsuna is rich in nutrients such as calcium, iron and betacarotene, and contains more calcium and iron than most other vegetables.

In addition, people in Tsuzuki are very kind and helpful, so if you need help, just ask!

I take swimming lessons at Tsuzuki Swimming Pool, so I would like to see a swimming race at the Olympics. I wish you all the best.

We interviewed Mr. Gerald Muirhead, a bagpiper.

He said the reason why he became a bagpiper is because his grandfather was a bagpiper, and so bagpipes were familiar to him. He also said that when he went to a concert using a ticket he had won as a prize in a painting contest, he was fascinated by its traditional and cool sound.

When I asked him how many types of bagpipes there are, he said that there used to be 30 types around the world, but nowadays, just four of them, which are from Ireland, England, Scotland and Spain, are famous and have been passed down.

The Scottish bagpipes that he uses are very heavy, weighing more than 4 kg. I was so impressed to hear that he has been highly active and has had various experiences such as playing for Queen Elizabeth and also playing a part of the film music for "Tales from Earthsea" by Studio Ghibli.

I want to be a respected person like him in the future.

We listened to Mr. Gerald Muirhead, a Japan-based bagpiper, playing the bagpipes and interviewed him. The bagpipes are a woodwind instrument using enclosed reeds fed from a constant reservoir of air in the form of a bag.

We asked him many questions in the interview.

- Q: Why did you start playing the bagpipes?
- A: There were two reasons. One was because my grandfather was also a bagpiper. And the second was because I was fascinated by its sound when I went to a concert using a ticket I had won as a prize in a painting contest.
- Q: I've read on the Internet that you played film music for Studio Ghibli in 2006. Could you tell me which film it was?
- A: It was Tales from Earthsea.
- Q: What is the hat you are wearing made of?
- A: It's made of ostrich feathers. It makes you look taller, so it was used by the (British) army.
- Q: Is it difficult to play the bagpipes?
- A: Yes. It's not like the piano where each key matches a specific musical note. It is difficult because the bagpipes are played by controlling your breathing.
- Q: Are there any female bagpipers?
- A: There used to be no female bagpipers, but there are now. Some 95% of all bagpipers are male. The female pipers use slightly smaller bagpipes.

There are not only Scottish bagpipes but also Irish, English, and Spanish ones. And the deer buckle on the belt and hat, which are part of a bagpiper's uniform, symbolizes "big and powerful" men. I think it is one of the country-specific cultures of Scotland where there are many wild deer.

### **■ Elegant Scottish culture**

I heard Mr. Gerald Muirhead playing the bagpipes at Hotch Potch Music Festival which was held at Atrium, an event space of the New City Hall in Yokohama, on 18th October.

He showed up wearing a kilt, which is traditional Scottish Highland dress. He was wearing red tartan check plaid on a gold-edged black jacket which was gorgeous and chic.

He played five songs while explaining how bagpipes work and a bagpiper's traditional dress. "Scotland the Brave," a Scottish patriotic song, sounded brave and elegant. He told us that it was actually played on the battlefield. I was lucky to hear the well-known song "Amazing Grace." The entire space was filled with its beautiful sound, and it made me feel calm as if I were in a Scottish meadow.

He plays the bagpipes at Hotch Potch Music Festival every year with a black feather bonnet and full Highland dress. Please come to the festival next year and experience Scottish culture.

#### ■ The importance of passing down traditions

I heard Mr. Gerald Muirhead playing the bagpipes at Hotch Potch Music Festival on 18th October and interviewed him. The reason why he started to play the bagpipes is because his grandfather was a bagpiper, and so bagpipes were familiar to him. He was very good at painting when he was a child and won a painting contest, winning a ticket for a bagpipe concert. After seeing the bagpiper's performance, he wanted to try playing.

After a while, he was awarded the Best Performance Award at the International Bagpipe Contest and became so famous that he performed for Queen Elizabeth. In addition, he played part of the film music for "Tales from Earthsea" by Studio Ghibli and said he would also like to perform at the Opening Ceremony of the Olympic Games.

Let me tell you about bagpipes. Bagpipes are roughly divided into the following four types. It is said that there used to be 30 types in the past. The Scottish bagpipes are best known and weigh more than 4 kg. The second is Irish bagpipes, which are always played sitting down and keeping the bags inflated via arm pressure. The third is English bagpipes, which are very small and relatively quiet. The fourth is the Spanish type.

By the way, the pipes which Mr. Gerald Muirhead plays are the best-known Scottish ones. I asked him if there are female bagpipers because my image is that pipers are usually men. He said there were no female pipers in the past, but nowadays, 95% of bagpipers are male and the other 5% are female. Recently, female pipers have been attracting attention because their fingers are thinner and more flexible for playing. I learned about their tradition through the interview and would like to pass down the tradition.

He had been taking care of a garden in the UK with his grandfather since he was 4 years old. He studied to be a designer at university, and came to Nagano, Japan for business 23 years ago. He is a head gardener, which means a leading garden designer. He taught us a lot about gardening and it was very interesting. To learn about Japan's climate, he keeps track of his garden every day.

He records various information such as the weather and temperature each day and reviews it later to produce a better garden. He sounded like a scholar. He said, "Garden design cannot be expressed by words, but can build an emotional connection. It's just like Shaun the Sheep." When I helped at the booth and saw visitors smiling, I thought his words are true, that we sometimes can understand each other's feelings without words.

## What a great Head Gardener! Kazuaki Tsunoda, 8th grader

We visited the Autumn Rose & Garden Market 2020 held at Nihon Odori, Yokohama Park and interviewed Mr. Mark Chapman. He works as a Head Gardener. It is a wonderful job as he looks after flowers even after gardening. He was born in the UK and has been using his experience of gardening built up since he was four years old and his knowledge of design acquired at university in the UK to become a Head Gardener. He has lived in Japan for 23 years, so he speaks Japanese very fluently.

I was surprised to hear that he tracked the weather every day for the first few years after starting to live in Japan. Since the climate of Japan is totally different from that of the UK and he needed to know it well, he recorded the weather day after day.

Another interesting thing is his favorite plant. It is Gunnera, known as Oibuki in Japanese. It started growing naturally about 150 million years ago and is known as the plant with the world's biggest leaf. When I heard about it, I thought there is no one like him who has been gardening for years.

In this interview, I learned about gardening and a gardener, about which I knew nothing. I found it is a very important job and would like to introduce this gardener.

In covering the Rose & Garden Market for the GOGB website, I helped the PR booth for the host town program and Team GB preparation camp and interviewed Mr. Mark Chapman, who was very impressive.

He is a garden designer and has been involved in gardening since he was a child. A garden designer must have a lot of knowledge such as the best soil for each plant, the environment, and the climate of each place. He said he can guess where plants come from when he hears their name.



He first came to Japan for business, and has lived here ever since, for 20 years. I asked him what the most memorable work in Japan was. He said it was designing the garden at the Hakuba Village ski resort in Nagano. The things he values most are learning about plants and thinking about our future, which he clearly explained with gestures. I did not know much about plants, but I learned some things in this interview and I now want to learn more about plants. This interview has also motivated me to continue looking after plants.

Mr. Mark Chapman has continuously recorded the climate in Japan since he started designing gardens after moving here. For example, he has written things like "there's a huge difference in temperature" or "it drizzles a lot in Japan" in his weather journal. I was impressed that he gathers various information as a gardener in his journal. I found that he tries hard to maintain a garden to make it better and increase his knowledge. I was also impressed that he thinks about landscaping for the garden in the future and plants flower bulbs to enjoy for a long time.

[Yokohama City] "A city tour to create an Accessibility Map of Yokohama as the Inclusive Host Town" – Being a friendly city for everyone

This time, junior reporters of the Tsuzuki Junior Editorial Board and MM (Minatomirai) Junior Editorial Board joined us to research and gather information to create an Accessibility Map of Yokohama, covering the area around Yokohama Baseball Stadium, the Games venue in Yokohama, and The Yokohama Red Brick Warehouse, the celebration site for the Olympic Torch Relay. This was one of our efforts to learn more about being an inclusive society taking the opportunity of the Tokyo 2020 Games.

On December 13, 2020, we junior reporters joined in the research to create an Accessibility Map of Yokohama, covering the area around The Yokohama Red Brick Warehouse, one of the celebration sites for the Olympic Torch Relay. Before creating the map, we listened to a talk online by the disabled people who work at NTT Claruty, about psychological barrier-free movement from the viewpoint of the disabled people.

Two people, one visually impaired and the other physically impaired, talked about their experiences, and all the stories were new to us. We found out that one in every thirteen people in Japan has some kind of disability and that there are different types. For example, some are totally impaired while others are partially impaired. Some people use a read-aloud function when reading text on their PC screen, but the speed of the voice was surprisingly fast when we tried it. We also learned it's helpful to refer to a clock face when giving directions for the visually impaired, and the person told us to talk first when going to help someone with visual impairment.

In the afternoon, we were divided into four groups, Zou-no-hana area, Bankoku Bridge area, Shinko Pier area and Bashamichi area, to walk and research using MaPiece. MaPiece is an app used to create an accessible map. The app lets you measure angles and slopes of crossings with your tablet PC: wheelchair users can go up slopes of 2-3 degrees, but over 5 degrees is hard for them, while a height difference of over two centimeters is also a barrier for them.

We added information to the map on our tablet PC such as the existence of traffic lights, acoustic traffic lights, one-way streets and yellow braille blocks.



They toured the city using the MaPiece app.

We shared roles and took turns to check the accessibility from the viewpoint of a wheelchair user, to assist a wheelchair user, to write down everything the group notices and to input information into the MaPiece app. After the research, we tried to use a wheelchair. We covered all the area to be researched and finally completed our tour with no troubles. After the tour, we gave a presentation to everyone about what we had found in our research. We hope the finalized map will help all the people in the world.

#### Comments and feedback by junior reporters+++++++

I tried a wheelchair for the first time and found that climbing and descending height differences with a wheelchair is very difficult, even if it's so low that you don't notice it. And I got motion-sickness, just like being carsick, after using a wheelchair for a long time. Joining the research tour to create a map brought lots of discoveries, and I learned how the disabled people feel.

I learned a lot in this tour for making an accessibility map. One lesson was that pay-phone booths are too narrow to get into with a wheelchair. Some of them have no slopes but steps, while others are too narrow to squeeze in. Since pay phones are important in an emergency, they should be made wheelchair accessible.

Atsuki Sawada, 6th grader

I had an opportunity to use a wheelchair in this tour and found that things which are natural to me can become barriers to the disabled people. For example, bulletin boards in the city are positioned at normal eye level, but that's too high for the disabled people, and the reflection makes the boards hard to read during the day. I also checked traffic lights and whether they're acoustic or not. I hope our study will help at the Olympics. Rinka Asaya

This tour was a really valuable experience. I realized how hard it is for the disabled people to go out and learned about the current city surroundings. I also learned that garbage and fallen leaves could sometimes be barriers. I would like to pick up garbage to make our city barrier-free.

Can you see any barriers in the streets and crossings you usually take? We joined the tour to create an accessibility map.

I tried using a wheelchair. It was easy to move forward when someone pushed the wheelchair, but it was hard to go up a slight slope when I tried it on my own. In addition, vending machines are too high for wheelchair users to reach. You might think the city is well-designed for the disabled people, but, through the eyes of them, I felt it is still not good enough and there is lots more to do. I hope the city will be more accessible in the future. Aisa Miyashita, 5th grader

I tried using a wheelchair and researched the accessibility and inaccessibility between Bashamichi Station and The Red Brick Warehouse. During the tour, one of the staff showed us an area designed to be accessible and it certainly was better compared to other areas, but it was not good enough: there were stairs and crossings without acoustic traffic signals. I hope the whole area in Yokohama will be made accessible and safe for all kinds of the disabled people so they can go out comfortably.



On March 19, we held an online seminar titled "Thoughts on the Diverse Society" in cooperation with the British Council and invited Ms. Susie Rogers, a British Paralympian, as a speaker for the seminar. Here are some of comments and feedback from junior reporters who participated in the seminar.

I participated in an online seminar titled "Thoughts on a Diverse Society" by Ms. Susie Rogers, a British Paralympic gold medalist. It was just an hour, but her talk covered a wide range of fields and was a valuable experience.

Ms. Susie Rogers is Paralympian who competed in the butterfly and the freestyle. She made splendid achievements such as winning three bronze medals at London 2012 Paralympics and not only a gold medal but also two bronze medals at the following Rio 2016 Games. After her retirement, she speaks globally on "Inclusion" and also advises and supports the disabled people as an adviser for the Disability Advisory Panel of the British Council. In the meanwhile, she, as a swimmer, works as an Ocean Ambassador for the Marine Conservation Society to protect the ecosystem.

"Inclusion" is the idea to ensure that every disabled person takes part in every field such as education, employment, leisure and society and to provide support and system necessary to realize that, and it means to embrace and coexist with all people, both those with and without disabilities. Ms. Rogers often used the word "Inclusion" in her talk which inspired me to think we should remove the barriers not only for the disabled people but also for the injured, the sick, the elderly, children and expectant mothers including ourselves.

She also mentioned it is important to promote barrier-free minds in addition to physical accessibility and functionality. To practice this, it is important to interact with more and more disabled people to learn about them. And to watch cool athletes at Paralympics would be the good start to know more about the disabled people. Ms. Rogers hopes that we apply the positive attitude of the Paralympic Games, where many different people come together and work together for its success, as a role model for our daily lives.

Unfortunately, I am not eligible to work as a volunteer for the Tokyo 2020, Paralympics, however I would definitely join the volunteer activity for the Paralympics if I have a chance. Minami Hashimoto

- Q. What inspired you to be a Paralympian?
- A. I used to watch the Paralympic Games on TV and felt there are great opportunities for the disabled people. When I found out London would stage the Paralympic Games, I wanted to compete in the Games in my own country. So, I worked hard to make my dreams come true.

- Q. What did you do to win a gold medal? And what was the thing that you struggled with to win a gold medal?
- A. It was hard to recover from many injuries and illness. I completely thought my training was going well, but hard training sometimes caused sudden illness and interrupted my training. Over four years between the Games, I did everything I could to leave a legacy. In that situation, my family was always there for me and supported me all the time. I was not alone; I was competing as a team. I could not have done this without the support from my coach and other staff members.

I was thinking too hard about how I can support disabled people when I see them, and I ended up staying away because I did not know how to help them.

The most impactful thing Ms. Susie said was to focus on the people themselves, instead of focusing on their disabilities. This message inspired me to interact more with the disabled people and make efforts to realize a fair world with no racism or prejudice.

# ■ "Olympism" practiced at Yokohama International Swimming Pool Jotaro Yamamoto

"GO GB" is the slogan of Yokohama City, Kawasaki City and Keio University, the host towns of the British National Team for Tokyo 2020. "GO" means "Good Luck" and "GB" is the abbreviation for Great Britain, which is the name of the island that belongs to the UK. The message is intended to cheer on the teams.

Today, we visited Yokohama International Swimming Pool in Tsuzuki ward. Yokohama City is the host town of the British National Team, and the pool is the training site for the British Swimming and Diving Olympic Teams.



Online interview with Mr. Tim Jones, camp director

First, we interviewed Mr. Tim Jones online. He visited Japan with the team as camp director. His main responsibilities are spotting young talent and designing the perfect schedule for the athletes. The team including athletes is staying at Hiyoshi Campus in Keio University. One of the interviewers asked him about the meals for the athletes, and his answer surprised me because he said it is a mix of half Japanese and half British. I thought the team would prefer their usual meals to maintain performance. But his answer reminded me that Olympic values encompass not just human development through sports, but also world peace. Of course it is important for the athletes to deliver their best at the Games, but I found that respecting multiple cultures is one approach toward peace.

Incidentally, Tim told us that his favorite Japanese food is dumplings.

In the second half, we interviewed Mr. Yoshida, director of Yokohama International Swimming Pool. He is more cheerful and friendly than I had imagined. Preparations for the camp at YIP began five years ago, and the staff at YIP work together with employees of Yokohama City, Tsuzuki Ward and travel agencies to support the Olympic team. It is already hard enough to provide the best possible environment to meet the athletes' requests, but extra precautions for Covid-19 countermeasures were needed due to the pandemic this year. However, Mr. Yoshida said with a smile that he feels honored to support the British National Swimming Team and hopes YIP will be a lucky place where they will win medals. Amid such difficult times, the staff supporting the team must remain positive like Mr. Yoshida.

Yokohama International Swimming Pool is the site of the pre-Games training camp for the British National Swimming Team. On July 28, in the middle of the Olympic Games, we interviewed Mr. Fumio Yoshida, director of the Pool, and Mr. Tim Jones, camp director of the British Swimming Team.

Yokohama International Swimming Pool is the largest swimming pool in Japan. The floor height is adjustable, and the water depth can be increased to 3.5 meters deep.

It has seating capacity for 4,000, and the 50-meter main pool is used as a sports arena in the fall and winter by placing panels on the floor. Mr. Yoshida said the staff must check carefully not to miss any tiny cracks on the floor when it is converted to an arena.

There are also a 5-meter-deep diving pool and a 50-meter sub pool in the facility, and the sub pool can be divided into two 25-meter pools.

Yokohama International Swimming Pool is taking strict Covid-19 countermeasures including health management, body temperature measurement, hand sanitizing, disinfection of equipment, ventilation and the 3Cs.

Mr. Yoshida said, "If a British athlete wins a medal, I will be so happy, as if I had won it!"

Tim is a retired swimmer and used to swim 6 kilometers, 6 hours a day. He travels around the world through swimming, but said it was hard to come to Japan due to the pandemic. By the way, his favorite Japanese food is dumplings.

I was surprised when I first learned that the floor of the main pool is adjustable. Unfortunately, I could not interview any athletes, but I talked with the director and was impressed by how much they train every day. I really hope the British athletes win medals at Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games.

Today, I interviewed two people who closely support the Olympic team.

The first one is Mr. Tim Jones who visited our hometown, Yokohama, for the pre-Games training camp as camp director.

One role of the camp director is to discover young talent, and the most important role is to support athletes so they can perform their best at the Games. Tim is a retired swimmer of the British National Team and used to support the Olympic team as a coach. I think he is able to bring out the best of athletes because he knows what to do from his experience as both an athlete and as a coach.

The Olympic swimmers of the British Team train up to 6 hours a day. Tim and all the other staff who support the athletes work very hard to help the athletes do their best, such as by providing a well-balanced diet and practicing infection control against Covid-19 by creating "bubbles" and communicating with the locals online. It sounds very tough.

At the end of the interview, he said it is important to believe you will win and focus on the race. I learned that it is also important to keep a positive attitude in life and move forward.

The other person we interviewed was Mr. Yoshida, director of Yokohama International Swimming Pool, one of the sites for the pre-Games training camp of the British National Team.

Mr. Yoshida also supports the British Olympic athletes like Tim and provides the best possible environment where all the athletes can make final preparations at Yokohama International Swimming Pool.

For example, staff at YIP have been making preparations and arrangements for five years and arranged the pre-Games training camp for the FINA World Championship two years ago. Regarding Covid-19 countermeasures, they use the latest technology including circulators to create a safe and secure environment. Thanks to their efforts, YIP earned an excellent reputation as the camp site. Mr. Yoshida himself said it was a great honor to host the British training camp.

In addition, Yokohama International Swimming Pool has a lot of secrets. There are three swimming pools here: the main pool, the depth of which can be adjusted up to 3.5 meters deep; the sub pool, where a wall can be placed to divide the pool into two 25-meter pools or one 50-meter pool; and the diving pool with a depth of 5 meters. All of the pools are adjustable to meet respective requirements. Between May and September, it is used as a swimming pool, and between October and April, it is used as a sports arena by adjusting the floor height and placing panels on the floor. In summer, aquatic classes such as swimming, artistic swimming and diving are held, and in winter, other sports classes such as soccer, dancing and tennis are held. As a result, the facility is used by many people all year round.

At the end of our interview, Mr. Yoshida revealed some special news: he is planning to exhibit the autographs of the British swimmers who participated in the camp and show some photographs of the training camp. I will definitely come back to see them.

Tokyo 2020 Olympics and Paralympics – The Olympic Games were held in a completely new format after the one-year postponement and with no spectators due to the pandemic. And now the Paralympic Games will begin.

Around the world, various negative opinions about the Olympics and issues with the government were reported on the Internet. And the Games itself faced many hardships. But after I interviewed two people who supported the British Team's camp, I learned that supporting someone warms everybody's heart and makes the world a better place.

# Men's Wheelchair Basketball – Great match between Japan and Great Britain

It's been 11 years since I started playing basketball at the age of eight, and I am still playing as a club activity at my high school. I usually watch the games of Japanese Professional Basketball "B. League" and NBA on TV, but this year, we had Olympic and Paralympic Games which are held only once every four years, so I watched the Olympics and Paralympics rather than B League and NBA.

I was especially fascinated with the Wheelchair Basketball. The reason why is not only that Japan reached semi-final but also that everything was new, impressive and respectable because I usually watch only the games by non-disabled athletes.

Japan competed against Great Britain in the Men's Semi-Finals. The British Team is the one of the powerhouses in Wheelchair Basketball and was even a world champion in the past. Passing was so quick by all the athletes of the British team and with their excellent performance, they easily managed to score back the points Japan put a lot of effort into scoring.

Japan, in the end, managed to win the Semi-Finals, but Great Britain had beat Spain in the Bronze Medal Match prior, and Spain had beaten Japan at the group stage game. So, the Semi-Finals could have gone either way.

I only focused on the Wheelchair Basketball, but both Olympics and Paralympics had fascinated many of us this year. Thank you for sharing the impressive moments with us! I'm also looking forward to see the British team at the Winter Olympic and Paralympic Games!

### The Unique Paralympics

After the Olympics, the Paralympics began with the opening ceremony on August 24. Ms. Yoshie Kris, who was responsible for all four opening and closing ceremonies of Tokyo 2020 as a creative director of the comprehensive planning team, is a director of SLOW LABEL, based in Zou-no-Hana Park, which facilitates disabled people and artists working together and develops collaborative products. Zou-no-Hana Park is a place that I often go to for a walk, so the ceremonies felt familiar to me. All the participants performed freely, making full use of their unique talents. It was more splendid and impressive than that of the Olympics and ended in the blink of an eye.

I was so proud because one artist from Yokohama was involved in such an honorable ceremony. And it made me to cheer on all the athletes who were in the venue.

Now, I would like to introduce a great athlete that caught my eye at the Paralympics. That is Ms. Sarah Storey, a UK para road cyclist. She was born without a functioning left hand. She is a former para swimmer and now compete as a para cyclist and has won 12 medals at 4 Games. I was impressed by her brave and ambitious attitude. She switched to cycling when she was 27 and has continuously worked hard. She now even competes in able-bodied cycling races. She might compete in both Olympic and Paralympic Games in the future. Her go-getter and powerful attitude is so respectable.

Another person said that the most impressive thing was that some athletes climbed stairs two or three at a time like a true athlete!

In the video messages from Team GB and Paralympics GB, the athletes expressed their gratitude, such as "The training camp was great" and "We really appreciate your support." I heard that they had taken various countermeasures against Covid-19 for the camp, and at the hotel where the team stayed, some areas were closed to other hotel guests to prevent contact with other people.

The training camps were held at Yokohama Stadium, International Stadium Yokohama, Yokohama International Swimming Pool, Kawasaki Todoroki Stadium, and Yokohama Country Club. I was especially surprised to hear that the marathon runners had trained at Yokohama Country Club.

Cross-cultural understanding is the first step toward world peace. I was able to talk with people from overseas (via a translator), which gave me a sense of tension which is hard to express, and I was thrilled. It was a pity the Games were held without spectators although it was a great chance to meet people from around the world. I would like to interview people and report about live, dramatic Olympics and Paralympics again when I grow up.

#### **Jotaro Yamamoto**

I joined in the research to create an Accessibility Map of Yokohama, covering the area around The Yokohama Red Brick Warehouse, one of the celebration sites for the Olympic Torch Relay.

This allowed me to learn about disabled people and to see the city, which I usually walk around without thinking, from a totally different perspective. Also, I have become more interested in Paralympic sports and impressed by the power of para-athletes which exceeds that of non-disabled people.

#### Yuki Ogawa

My experience as a junior reporter made me more interested in the Olympics and Paralympics and watching the Games. I wish I could have talked more with the British athletes.

#### Michiaki Hasegawa

I learned about British culture by interviewing Mr. Gerald Muirhead, a bagpiper. His performance was amazing. Having become more interested in it, I now want to learn more about British culture and special things.

#### Aisa Miyashita

I covered the Olympics and Paralympics as a junior reporter and learned about lots of sports which I didn't know before. Para-athletes are grouped into many different categories, and I never got tired of watching the Games with so many exciting events.

#### Mei Hashimoto

It was a pity that the interview with the British team was held online, but I was happy to feel so close to them.

#### **Hiryu Orishimo**

I interviewed Mr. Tim Jones, camp director of the British Swimming Team, and learned about meals and training programs during the camp. It was a valuable experience.

#### Momone Akatsu

I had joined some interviews and reported on the Tokyo 2020 Games and the British National Teams. At the "500 Days To Go Festival – 500 days to go until the Tokyo 2020 Games" which was held about three years ago, I experienced wearing a prosthesis and playing wheelchair basketball. I learned how to walk with a wobble with the prosthesis and how difficult it is to move around a narrow space in a wheelchair. I also had a chance to see a live show of "Alchemist" singing "Ano Sora" and "Foorin" singing "Paprika" which really cheered me up.

Also, I was lucky to see Britain's Prince Harry. We joined the exchange program between Prince Harry and the wheelchair basketball athletes aiming to compete at the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games. Prince Harry kept good eye contact with everyone and smiled while talking, and I was impressed with his gentlemanly manner.

The experience of interviewing Mr. Gerald Muirhead, the Scottish bagpiper, also left a deep impression. The beautiful melody of "Amazing Grace," which he performed in traditional dress with black and red tartan check plaid, was captivating.

Tokyo 2020 was held with no spectators due to the Covid-19 pandemic, and we had to watch the Games on TV, but when I saw the British athletes competing, I felt an affinity with them because they had visited Yokohama for their training camp, making me realize that the Olympics were really being held in Japan. By serving as a junior reporter, I directly learned the power of sports and fascinating British culture. I really appreciate the valuable opportunity.

A Real Taste of Britain in Yokohama: A UK-themed Walking

Course Guide (Kannai – Motomachi Edition)



The City of Yokohama is set to host the pre-Games preparation camp of the British Olympic and Paralympic teams for the Tokyo 2020 Games. Take a quick look back through history, though, and you will soon discover how the relationship between Yokohama and the United Kingdom goes back much further, to the end of the Edo period (mid-19th century), around the time when the Port of Yokohama first opened up.

So why not take this opportunity to find out about the history of interaction between the United Kingdom and Japan while enjoying a stroll through the streets of Yokohama. In this guide, the GOGB Column Editing Department introduces a recommended walking course that will give you a real taste of Britain in Yokohama, featuring a route beginning in Kannai and ending Motomachi.

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#### **Nihon Odori Street**



Our walking tour starts from Nihon Odori Street in the Kannai area. This area sustained heavy damage during a major fire which broke out in 1866, including not only Japanese residential areas but also foreign settlements. As such, urgent steps were taken to redevelop the area, such as putting in place modern street plans and coming up with measures to prevent fires. Japan's first ever Western-style roads were constructed here as part of this work, designed by Richard Henry Brunton, a British designer who also designed Yokohama Park. You can find a bust of Brunton on a corner of this street.



The tiles embedded into the street also give a sense of Yokohama's history from around the time of the port's opening.

This street, which leads to the Port of Yokohama and is lined with buildings including Kanagawa Prefectural Government's Office, Yokohama Archives of History, and Yokohama District Court and Yokohama Summary Court, offers picturesque scenery all year round, including rows of beautiful gingko trees in autumn and stunning illuminations in winter. The street is broad and spacious, steeped with an atmosphere reminiscent of a British movie.

### **Yokohama Archives of History**



Yokohama Archives of History consists of two buildings: a new building facing Kaigan-dori Street, and a small old building surrounded by a courtyard. The old building was originally constructed to house the British Consulate General. This building was designed by the British government and all of the materials used in its construction were brought all the way from the UK. As such, both the exterior and interior give the appearance of a quintessential British building. The museum features easy to understand displays on the history of the Port of Yokohama, charting its growth as a port town through the use of photos, contemporary newspaper cuttings, models etc., making it a fun place for even children to come and learn. There is a camphor tree in the courtyard, a symbol of the Yokohama Archives of History.



One cannot help but feel a sense of awe at how this dignified tree has been standing in the same place since the Edo period, witnessing the course of Yokohama's history from the opening of the port to the present day.

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#### Café: Au jardin de Perry



Au jardin de Perry, a café located on a corner of Yokohama Archives of History, is housed in a building that was once used as guardhouse for the former British Consulate General. The café faces Kaiko Hiroba Park, a square commemorating the opening of the Port of Yokohama.



This was also the place where the Convention of Kanagawa was signed, a peace treaty reached between Japan and the US in 1854, and is the perfect place to sit back and unwind with a cup of tea in a historical setting.

#### Silk Center (Silk Museum)



Following the opening of the Port of Yokohama in 1859, many foreign merchants came to the port area to set up shop.

The Silk Center is located at the former site of the Yokohama branch of Jardine Matheson Holdings Limited, a major British conglomerate that was involved in the silk trade at the time of the port's opening.







The Silk Museum opened in 1959 to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the opening of the Port of Yokohama. In addition to learning about the history of silk, which contributed to Yokohama's development as a port city, you can also enjoy workshops, searching for silk items in the museum shop, and other fun events.



The museum also boasts stunning views of the port, another reason why it has been included on this recommended walking itinerary.

#### **NYK Hikawa Maru (Yamashita Park)**



Walk alongside the port from the Silk Center and you will find Yamashita Park. This park was created as a part of a reconstruction project following the Great Kanto Earthquake in 1923, using the rubble left by the earthquake for landfill.

The Hikawa Maru, an ocean liner floating in the port alongside Yamashita Park, was once nicknamed "The Queen of the North Pacific," and is now permanentlyberthed alongside Yamashita Park.

The Hikawa Maru was built in 1930 for use on a regular liner route between Yokohama and Seattle. Prior to the breakout of the Pacific War, the ship's famous passengers included English comedian Charlie Chaplin, and Prince Chichibu and his wife, who were returning to Japan after having attended King George VI's coronation in the UK.

The Hikawa Maru, now decommissioned, has been preserved as an Important Cultural Property, a floating museum which retains the glory of its heyday. Visitors can look around the ship's interior and gaze over the port steeped in an opulent atmosphere of sea voyages from days gone by.

#### **British House Yokohama**



If you carry on past Yamashita Park and keeping walking in the direction of Motomachi, you will arrive at British House Yokohama, located adjacent to Harbor View Park. This house is the former British consular residence, where the British consul general lived with his family.





The nameplate with royal insignia beside the front gate and copperplate beside the front entrance testify to the building's long and prestigious background. Also, the small gate to the left of the front gate served as an entrance for servants, giving insights into the history of Britain's class society. From the moment you enter, you will feel as if you have stepped back in time to a bygone Britain, with the building's chalk white walls, furniture and interior décor hearkening back to life in those days.

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#### Yokohama Christ Church on the Bluff



Yokohama Christ Church on the Bluff is a church belonging to the Anglican Church in Japan, which shares many of the traditions and practices of the Church of England. Built from oya tuff stone, this church is a landmark of the Yamate area of Yokohama, an imposing building constructed in the style of a Norman church from medieval Britain.

The current building is actually the third church building. The second building, which was constructed at the current location, was destroyed during the Great Kanto Earthquake. A temporary building was set up in the aftermath of the earthquake until construction of the third building was complete. This impressive building lends the surrounding area a profound air, giving a sense of history and the ongoing faith of those who have continued to come here to worship over the years.

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#### The Yokohama Foreign General Cemetery



Many foreign nationals who passed away while in Japan are buried here in this cemetery, including many people from the United Kingdom, such as soldiers who died during the First World War on the way to battlefields from Japan. The Yokohama Foreign General Cemetery Museum is located next to the cemetery.



In addition to providing an overview of history from the end of the Edo period (mid-19th century), this museum uses explanatory panels and photographs to introduce the lives of some of the people buried here, including British engineers and other notable people who contributed to Japan's modernization during the Meiji period. For museum lovers, the Yokohama Foreign General Cemetery Museum is certainly worth a visit.

#### Yokohama Motomachi Shopping Street



Walk down the slope from the Yokohama Foreign General Cemetery in the direction of Motomachi-Chukagai Station, and you will find Yokohama Motomachi Shopping Street. During the days when Yokohama was first opening up as a port, this shopping street developed through the appearance of shops aimed at foreigners at a location linking foreign settlements in Yamashita-cho and the Yamate area.

Unusual for the time, shops here formed sister partnerships with shopping streets in other countries to enable direct imports from famous stores overseas. Sister partnerships with London's Strand and five other shopping streets in 1967 have served to promote further growth in this area of town. With rows of stores selling everything from fine pottery to antique import goods, just browsing through the huge range of products on offer here will put you in the mood for shopping. Benches are located throughout the shopping street, providing the perfect place to stop for a rest with views over town.





Exploring the Secrets behind an International-level Swimming Pool! What kind of Place is Yokohama International Swimming Pool?



Yokohama International Swimming Pool is due to be used as a facility for the pre-Games preparation camps of the British Olympic and Paralympic teams for the Tokyo 2020 Games.

An internationally approved swimming pool, it has played host to a number of major international tournaments, such as the Pan Pacific Swimming Championships, in which top swimmers like Ian Thorpe and Kosuke Kitajima participated.



Yokohama International Swimming Pool is located in close proximity to Kita-Yamata Station on the Yokohama Municipal Subway Green Line. The large steps leading up to the pool have been decorated with messages and banner flags proclaiming, "GO GB 2020", which are sure to make you feel more and more welcoming with every step!

For this issue, we spoke with Ms. Hiromi Abe, a manager at Konami Sports Co., Ltd., the designated manager of Yokohama International Swimming Pool, about the features of this facility and their preparedness for hosting the British teams.

# As both a much-loved facility in the local community and an internationally approved swimming




#### Ms. Abe

Yokohama International Swimming Pool functions as both a sports facility used by members of the public and a sports stadium which plays host to major domestic and international tournaments in its capacity as an internationally approved swimming pool. As manager, it is my duty along with around 100 members of staff to deal with visitors and manage safety at the pool on a day-to-day basis, as well as to prepare for and administer major tournaments at such times these are held.

There are many familiar faces who come to use our facilities regularly, and we always make sure to greet everyone with courtesy and ask how they are doing in terms of their physical condition.

## Main Pool during the summer season, Sports Floor during the winter season




The Main Pool, an internationally approved 50 m swimming pool with approximately 4,000 spectator seats running along both sides.



The Main Pool changes aspect during the winter season, becoming the Sports Floor. It is also known widely as the home arena of the Yokohama B-Corsairs, a professional basketball team based in Yokohama.

#### Ms. Abe

The Main Arena of Yokohama International Swimming Pool is extremely unusual in that it is used as the Main Pool during the summer season (from May until September) and as the Sports Arena during the winter season (from November until March). There is a transition period of around a month, as we need to gradually drain the pool to convert it into a floor.



The Sub Pool, one of the nation's biggest internationally approved 50 m swimming pools, can be used all year round.

## The existence of professional staff who help organise tournaments from behind the scenes

## —What kinds of things to you pay particular attention to as an internationally approved swimming pool?

#### Ms. Abe

The water in our swimming pools is like a living creature. The water's condition changes daily, even hourly. Needless to say, as an internationally approved swimming pool, it is vital that we constantly maintain the water in a good condition, and leaks or machinery defects are something we cannot afford to let happen. We have 20 members of staff constantly monitoring the room temperature, water quality, water temperature, water depth, etc. of the pools. In fact, it is very difficult to increase the water temperature of pools, so water temperature checks also need to be performed during the night. In addition, pool users will notice a bigger temperature difference if the difference between room temperature and water temperature is severe, which is why controlling the air conditioning is another important job.




Staff members carry out water quality tests every hour to maintain a safe water quality level.

Gym with a view of trees, available for use by beginners and professionals alike.


### —As a facility, what kinds of preparations do you intend to put in place to welcome the British teams?

#### Ms. Abe

We need to put in place the special preparations for the British teams and elite athletes, which is why we are making efforts with the British teams to ensure tomeet their requirements. During the year 2018, we renewed our starting blocks and lane ropes for competitive swimming events. And we are sure the improvements would make the facility better-equipped and more attractive also for local users.

In January this year, we conducted an anti-terrorism drill at Yokohama International Swimming Pool, in which around 150 people participated, including representatives from such organizations as Yokohama International Swimming Pool, Tsuzuki Police Station, Tsuzuki Ward Office, Tsuzuki Fire Corps, and Tsuzuki Fire Department. All related organizations are cooperating in taking all possible measures to ensure safety.

In addition, in the Entrance Hall, we are endeavoring to foster a welcoming atmosphere for the British teams through a panel display on the UK and a countdown display for the Tokyo 2020 Games.

Visit the Japan Para Swimming Championships at Yokohama International Swimming Pool and learn about para swimming!



Between 21 (Sat) and 23 (Mon, national holiday) September, the Yokohama International Swimming Pool, which will host the Team GB's Tokyo 2020 pre-Games preparation camp, will stage the 2019 Japan Para Swimming Championships, an event commemorating His Majesty The Emperor's Accession to the Throne this year. Last year, some 41 competitors from eight countries around the world joined Japanese swimmers in a championship that is gaining more and more attention as an international competition.

Thus, with the 2020 pre-Games camp getting closer, it is time to put the spotlight on the championships as a taster of what will come in the Paralympics, and, likewise, introduce some of the top GB swimmers who are expected to participate in the Tokyo 2020 Paralympics.

# **Basic Knowledge for More Enjoyment of the Japan Para Swimming Championships**

The Japan Para Swimming Championships is the pinnacle event for domestic para swimming. It has been running since 1991 as a competition to ready top competitors for the Paralympics and World Championships. The records set at the championships are officially recognized internationally, one of the few events thus recognized in Japan. Apart from the Japanese swimmers, the 2018 championships attracted 41 swimmers from GB, USA, Canada, Mexico, Colombia, Spain, Australia and New Zealand, truly making it an international event.

The Championships basically abide by FINA rules, with FINA rules also applying to pool regulations and stroke types (freestyle, backstroke, breaststroke and butterfly), while gender-specific swimmers are classed by impairment types/severities to compete in an order that has competitors of approximately the same ability competing against each other. Impairment types are prefixed with a letter ("S," "SB" or "SM") and numbered to indicate sport class, with physical impairments ranging from 1 to 10, visual disabilities from 11 to 13, intellectual disability at 14 and hearing disability at 15 (there are also classes for swimmers with lesser impairments), with numbers increasing from low ones for severe activity limitation to high ones for lesser activity limitation. Moreover, the race strokes are denoted with "S" for freestyle, backstroke and butterfly, "SB" for breaststroke and "SM" for individual medley – for example, "SB1" stands for the class for the most severe activity limitation of physically impaired swimmers.

Still further, as much as possible, the championships are managed in accordance with general swimming competition rules, with special rules also employed in unavoidable situations due to the nature of a swimmer's activity limitation. For example, for swimmers who find it difficult to use starting blocks, an in-water start is permitted, while tapping poles can be used by coaches to let visually impaired swimmers know that they are about to reach the pool wall for a turn or to finish a race.

These classifications and rules are the same as those for Tokyo 2020 Paralympics Swimming, which means the Japan Para Swimming Championships is a great opportunity for seeing and learning about all aspects of para swimming before the Paralympics.

#### The appeal of seeing personalized strokes to master activity limitation



It is not only the classifications and rules to be learned at the Japan Para Swimming Championships, you can also enjoy the live atmosphere of para swimming races, discovering the effort, ingenuity and skill that swimmers adopt to overcome activity limitations in order to be competitive enough to win by split-second times.

The type of impairment and the severity vary, so the optimum swimming style varies with the swimmer. For example, a swimmer with only one leg and one arm and a hemiplegic swimmer are going to have completely different propulsion and floating issues, which will make swimming in a straight line complicated, so such swimmers go through a trial-and-error learning curve to find the best way to swim and swim quickly based on the general swimming style for the stroke they are competing in.

Hence, even in a race of the same stroke, the styles will be very personalized. Thus, watching para swimming as pure sport has great appeal because the spectator can wonder at the amount of practice and effort that has gone into mastering a stroke as well as wonder at why a particular style has been chosen. So, come and watch the "drama" behind the times recorded in para swimming.

#### GB para swimmer stars who could well be at Tokyo 2020

The swimming competition is one of the stellar events of the Paralympics, being an official event from the first Paralympics in Rome in 1960.

And, along with the USA, China and Ukraine, etc., Team GB is one of the strong Paralympics nations, picking up a total of 16 gold medals (Women: 10, Men: 6) at the Rio Paralympics 2016.

Now let us introduce you to some of the key swimmers with illustrious careers who are likely to be making a splash at Tokyo 2020.

#### Bethany Firth



A GB female representative who picked up three golds (100m backstroke S14, 200m freestyle S14, 200m individual medley SM14) and one silver (100m breaststroke SB14) at the Rio Paralympics. Among these successes, Bethany notched up a new world record in the 100m backstroke S14, showing overwhelming domination in the class.

#### Stephanie Millward



Born in 1981, this female GB para swimming legend is a veteran competitor, grabbing two golds (100m backstroke S8,  $4 \times 100$ m medley), one silver (200m individual medley SM8) and two bronzes (100m freestyle S8, 400m freestyle S8) at the Rio Paralympics.

#### Toni Shaw



Although born in 2003 and just 16 years old, Toni won the 400m freestyle S9 at the 2018 European Championships, claiming the No. 1 ranking in the world at the time, marking this female swimmer out for greater things. And, at the Japan Para Swimming Championships last year, she blasted her way to a win in the 400m freestyle S9 race, leading the second-place swimmer by more than seven seconds.

#### Reece Dunn



Already, in 2019, this 24-year old male swimmer has set two new world records (100m freestyle S14, 200m freestyle S14), showing that he really is on the rise. All eyes will be on him to see what kind of performance he turns in at the Japan Para Swimming Championships in preparation for Tokyo 2020.

The Japan Para Swimming Championships promises to be packed with top-class swimmers. And, although their places are not cemented for Tokyo 2020, if they are picked, you can be sure that they will be in the mix for gold!

Why not come and join us at the Japan Para Swimming Championships to support GB swimmers who are likely to be at Tokyo 2020!

Come and Enjoy a British Pub – a Very British Socializing

Spot – in Yokohama



Yokohama is going to host British national team for the Tokyo 2020 Olympics and Paralympics games. Indeed, Yokohama was one of the first places to adopt British culture back in the 19th century when the city's port was opened to foreign trade, and, even today, there are still hallmarks of British culture to be found strongly rooted in the streets of the city.

Here, with the aim of getting to know Britain better, I would like to introduce one of the uniquely British cultures, the "pub".

To do that, I spoke with Clive Poole and Kae Doshin, the publican and chef of "Full Monty", a British pub they have been running in Yokohama for the last 15 years, about their thoughts on GO GB 2020.

On that note, why don't we take a look at an authentic British pub to get an idea about British culture?

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#### The pub – a social arena indispensable to the British.

The pub is something that has developed in Britain with a special twist on the public bar. When one mentions the UK, the "pub" is always in the conversation. Even in films, there are often scenes featuring pubs. The ambience of a pub says a lot about the daily lives of British people, but what does the "pub" really mean as a place to the British?

Looking back in history, the formal name for a pub is a "public house", literally "pub" means "house". So, what started with the custom of the British inviting people into their homes to socialize became an external affair, with bars jointly run in places such as inns, shops and cricket clubs, evolving into the "pubs" known today.

Thus, the pub is the starting point for revealing how the British like to communicate – namely, drinking and talking convivially in the good company of dear friends.



#### (Clive Poole)

Pubs are where we British people gather to socialize. As a nation, the British enjoy meeting people and sharing a drink over a chat. So, after work or on the weekend, families will say, 'Let's go to the pub!' and head off to the local. And, it doesn't matter what the occasion, as the great thing about pubs is how really easy they are to drop into."

#### (Kae Doshin)

"Groups are welcome, of course, but so are individuals. Customers enjoy the banter of whoever is in the pub in whatever situation. Yet, that doesn't mean that socializing is a forced agenda. One of the charms of pubs is the comfortable sense of distance between customers. Indeed, among our customers, there are individuals who will quietly spend their time drinking on their own from opening to closing time.

Thus, each in his or her own way is free to do as they please, which means the pub is an invaluable place for British people to relax in. I'd say that the pub is a unique bit of culture that doesn't exist in Japan, don't you think?"

In recent years, smoking has been banned in British pubs, paving the way for a growing number of kids' friendly pubs in the UK, it seems, which is similar to the kids' spaces and kids' menus starting to be offered in dining bars in Japan.

# Let's enjoy some "Cider", the flavor and aroma of Britain, in the setting of a British pub!

I was quick off the mark to ask Clive and Kae about what things are on the menu of an authentic British pub!

First off, drinks. Well, if we're talking about British pub drinks, then they've got to be beers and ciders. Straight off, I have to note that cider is not something we associate with Japanese bars, which doubtless makes it an exotic drink for us Japanese. Cider is "apple juice alcohol". Incidentally, in France, it's known as "cidre".

#### (Kae Doshin)

Ciders are not only made in the UK but also in various other countries, such as France, Spain and Germany. But, in the UK, special varieties of apple are grown for cider, and some ciders are made in accordance with ancient methods. If you get a chance to go to a British pub, do try the cider, as it comes from a deeply intriguing culture."



Full Monty carries 70 types of cider – an array that speaks of an authentic pub and evidently draws customers from many, many miles away. Most brands come in 500ml bottles, each poured into a glass for your enjoyment.

Beers come in units of "pints" or "half pints". These are the measures you order in! (BTW: 1 pint = approximately 568ml).

Next is the cuisine. And, of course, the archetypal "soul foods" for British people have to be "fish-and-chips", "meat pies" and "roast dinners".



"Meat Pie"

Stewed meat et al baked in a pie. And, at Full Monty, everything – from the pie pastry onward – is made by hand.



Lamb Steaks & Mash with Homemade Gravy"

The gravy – an essential in British cooking – is made from stewed beef bones, cooked slowly in the oven for 5 hours.



"Fish-and-chips"

A mouth-watering delight of whitefish coated in batter made from flour and beer.

"Just like we have a culture of bonito (katsuo) and seaweed (konbu) in Japan," says Kae, "so the British feel at home when they smell gravy. The aroma of gravy at dinnertime in the streets of Britain is a unique one. Likewise, at the Full Monty, many of our customers are British who are looking for the flavor of home!"

Things to know about the Full Monty that will make things even more of a delight include the need to order food and drinks at the bar, and pay when you get your order. The pub also employs a unique house rule for groups, where individual members of a group take turns to buy a "round of drinks" for the group.

Cider and the flavors and aromas of Britain, along with encounters and conversations are the true pleasures of a British pub. So, why not stretch your legs and step into the Full Monty, to delight in the true flavors or a real British pub?

# Thinking of the connection between the UK and Yokohama, I want to broadcast British culture, anew!

Finally, I asked Kae and Clive about their thoughts on GO GB 2020.



#### (Clive Poole)

When Japan opened up to commerce with the world, Yokohama was the first to adopt British culture, giving the city a strong British connection. And, as the city will be hosting Team GB during the 2020 Olympics and Paralympics, I want to broadcast British culture, anew!

I personally like football and rugby, so it would be great to create opportunities to introduce British culture to my customers while we enjoy some sport on screen at the Full Monty."



#### (Kae Doshin)

I want to take this opportunity to remind people of the wonderful food culture Britain has. It is rarely acknowledged, but popular dishes, such as sandwiches and roast beef, originated in the UK. British culture exists everywhere in Yokohama. Yet, it is so woven into our daily lives that we cannot see it!

Thus, we are planning some events to bring British culture into focus again, so that we can pass on even more of the delights of British culture to the many people who come to watch the Olympics and Paralympics or visit Yokohama for sightseeing."

This time round, I have introduced the British pub, an essential part of any conversation about the British.

Pub life is not well known in Japan, but step across the threshold, and you will find a warm British-style community, where even strangers delight in easy-going chitchat. So, why not take this opportunity to experience the delights of a British pub?



Why not visit the City's "English Garden" to experience the natural beauty of flowering plants!



Yokohama will host the preparation camps of the British Olympic and Paralympic teams. What is more, with the opening of the Yokohama port in the final years of the Edo period (1853-1868), Yokohama was quick to embrace British culture.

With that in mind, we would like to use this article to present the Yokohama English Garden, a spot where you can enjoy British culture. Our guide was Satoshi Kuroda, a gardener at Yokohama English Garden. He introduced us to the various seasonal plants in the garden, which is home to 2,000 plant species and vistas bulging with more than 2,200 roses. He also showed us the appeal of seasonal differences to be seen with each visit and taught us about the British culture that shaped that appeal.

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# The thrill of an English Garden is the enjoyment of natural beauty found in flowering plants

The essence of English Gardens is the "enjoyment of natural beauty", which stems back to the first English-style gardens of the 18th and 19th centuries. With the real thrill of an English Garden being the illusion that the garden has somehow been lifted directly out of a natural setting, affording a sense of raw wild potency seen in the beauty of flowering plants. Differing from the geometric designs of Italian and French style gardens, the views in English Gardens offer a sense of depth in a left-right asymmetric setting, somehow hinting at a beauty similar to that seen in segments of a Japanese garden.

"The crux of an English Garden involves mixed planting in a natural setting. Although manmade, the delight is derived by creating a natural vista by arranging a blend of various plants. Nevertheless, having got that natural look, it does not mean that the garden can be left to grow wild. What is required is the knowledge of each plant's characteristics, and the planning skills to plant each one at the right time and in the right location.

The point here is that the gardener needs to have the knowledge to choose which plants work in which environments. Just because the aimed for effect is an English Garden, that does not mean that you have to use British plants, you should dare to use the plants that you like."

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#### Japan's involvement in British gardening culture

British gardening culture changed greatly in the 18th and 19th centuries thanks to the many plants brought back to Britain by plant hunters, who roamed the world to augment the small number of plants that grow naturally in Britain. Back then, plant hunters from the countries of northern Europe, including Britain, travelled to Asia, Africa and Latin America and gathered prized plants, with, it is said, hydrangeas, wild chrysanthemums and others taken back from Japan.

On the back of this plant boost, the Horticultural Society of London was established by plant-loving Londoners, and gardening culture flourished.





Philipp Franz von Siebold (1796-1866) took the lacecap hydrangea (native to Japan) back to Holland, where, it is said, work progressed to increase the varieties. Back then, Seibold named the Japanese lacecap hydrangea "Hydrangea otakusa", with Otakusa being the pet name of his Japanese wife. And, hydrangeas can be enjoyed in the Yokohama English Garden in June.

Through the 90s and 00s, British gardening culture became immensely popular in Japan, with English roses – noted for their slender stems and a soft impression – from the famous rose nursery of David Austin becoming extremely popular.

And, even though these are hard to come by nowadays, the Yokohama English Garden has several collections of David Austin's roses.

# What's there to enjoy in the Yokohama English Garden from autumn 2020 to spring 2021?

At the Yokohama English Garden, where the keynote is the rose, which also happens to be Yokohama's symbolic flower, the four seasons sees an array of flowering plants take a proud bow as they step into bloom, including over 30 species of cherry trees in spring and some 300 species of hydrangeas in early summer. Therefore, we asked Satoshi Kuroda about what we should look out for in the period between autumn 2020 and spring 2021.

#### (Satoshi Kuroda)

"The species of plants at the Yokohama English Garden are many and varied. From the middle of October to the end of November, autumn roses are the blooms that catch the eye. While there are other roses in their prime in both spring and summer, autumn roses offer excellent colors and fragrances, with the expansive spread of the blooms making them especially attractive to the eye. What is more, the blooms on this year's roses are bigger than usual. The gradual lowering of temperature in autumn means that rose petals slowly unfurl to a greater size. And, the deep, burgundy color are due to that gradual blooming process."



Rows of splendid roses with blooms the size of a clenched fist – wow, so many roses steeped in delightful fragrances, the aroma of damask that is so redolent of a rose, as well as others with fruity fragrances and more!

"Spring, in early to mid-May is a great time to view roses. And, the star attraction in Yokohama English Garden is our 50-meter long rose tunnel, with roses in full bloom in mid-May. The rich scents of the rose-filled tunnel make even the simplest of walks through a heady, fragrance-filled experience. Early to mid-May is a precious period as we work to get the roses in the tunnel and nearby environs to bloom in unison. We gardeners closely observe minute changes, such as temperature, humidity and amount of sunlight, employing our green fingers to ensure that all the roses come into bloom in this period – so, this is the time when show what we are made of. Hence, we truly hope that as many people as possible will come and visit the garden to enjoy the vistas of beautiful roses in bloom."





This time round, we took a look at our English Garden, which originated from British gardening culture.

With a shared love of natural beauty, doubtless the British and Japanese are close in terms of sensitivity.

Christmas decorations will be on show from 24 November at the Yokohama English Garden. The double enjoyment of seasonal festive decorations and garden vistas is yet another appealing reason to visit – so, why not come and enjoy Yokohama English Garden!
